FOCUS ON: BELSIZE COMMUNITY LIBRARY

Pat Holden writes:

"The only thing that you absolutely have to know, is the location of the library." -- Albert Einstein

Belsize Community Library, situated in Antrim Road, was built in 1937, replacing the original library founded in 1897. The design by architects Gold and Aldridge won widespread acclaim for its use of open–plan spaces. The library continues to be owned by Camden Council; but following threatened closure, its management was taken over by the Winchester Project (the Winch) in 2012. In 2016 the library building was granted 'listed' status.

Over the years, many Belsize residents, including some of the most vulnerable, have enjoyed the facilities offered in the library, from older people reading the newspapers and looking for human interaction, to mothers with young children who feel isolated and young people looking for a place to do their homework. The library is now a thriving community centre offering a wide variety of activities with many focusing on children. It is also available for hire. However, due to financial constraints, the library is only open from Monday to Wednesday. The initial grant awarded by Camden to the Winch has now expired and the library continues mainly with the support of generous benefactors. Its future as a library and community space is, therefore, precarious.



The forerunner organisation of the Friends of Belsize Library was established in 1988 in order fight the closure of the library planned at the time. The library was saved and the Friends have continued to provide voluntary community support to the library to raise its profile as a community resource, and to ensure the retention and development of library facilities in the building. For many years the Friends have organised monthly events with speakers giving talks on literary, historical and cultural topics. Currently the events take place on the third Thursday of every month. These events serve to bring together people from the local community and act as a reminder that the library continues to perform an important local function. Events are listed in the BRA newsletter and displayed on the Village and Haverstock Hill noticeboards.

The continued functioning of the library is likely to depend on financial contributions to the library and on the continuing interest and support of the local community.



I lived for 39 years in Belsize Grove. I have just had my 99th birthday and my daughter has given me the beautifully presented book 'Belsize Remembered'. I was fascinated to read an article by Susanna Duncan on Belsize Library which I am thrilled to see is still open. I chaired the historic meeting in 1988 when we were shocked to learn that Camden Council wished to shut our library to save the costs of the salaries of two librarians. We went on to take legal action with Sydney Kentridge QC, famous for his work against

A NEW CONSTITUTION FOR A NEW SOCIETY? COME TO THE AGM TO DECIDE

very important information for all members

Since the last AGM in March 2017, the BRA Committee has worked on how we might change from an unincorporated association (the Belsize Residents Association) into a charitable society (the Belsize Society). This would involve a number of very significant changes. A sub-group of the Committee has put together a draft constitution which closely reflects the Charity Commission's model constitution for a Charitable Incorporated Organisation with voting members other than its charity trustees. The draft constitution is too long to reproduce here. Highlights include:

Name: A charitable organisation needs to exist primarily for the benefit of the population at large, not just its members. The BRA has always sought to benefit everyone by ensuring Belsize is a good place to live, work and visit, and our membership has never been confined solely to those who live here. The new name would reflect this.

Objects: Our charitable objects would be the most important part of the constitution. We have carefully considered what those objects should be and have concluded that the Belsize Society would:

- (1) Promote for the benefit of the public high standards of architecture, conservation, planning, design, maintenance and use of buildings and infrastructure compatible with the character and quality of life in and/or affecting Belsize Ward, its adjacent areas and its historical environs; and promote the protection development and improvement of features of historic or public interest in that area including considering and promoting traffic solutions for problems occurring in the area and ensuring the maintenance and improvement of the quality of the streets and public places and the protection of the environment and improvement of air quality; and
- (2) Foster interest amongst the public in Belsize Ward, its adjacent areas and its historical environs and educate the public in the history, including natural history and architecture, of the area by organising lectures, visits and other events.

We are confident that this formulation expresses the wishes of members as expressed at the last AGM and sets out objects which will be regarded as genuinely charitable

Powers and the application of income and property, payments to trustees, conflicts of interest: Clauses in a new constitution would allow us to fundraise, enter into contracts, own property (eg our sound system and crockery) and also ensure that no trustee can use the Society for personal advantage.

Membership and liability of members: There would be no change to who may be a member and how they join. The Society would levy membership subscriptions. It would entail the membership secretary continuing to be scrupulous in maintaining a list of members and

oblige us to notify members whose membership is discontinued (eg for non-payment of subscription). As before, membership would be open only to individuals, and not to corporate bodies or businesses. The only duty laid on members is to act in good faith. Members carry no liabilities.

Decisions and Annual General Meetings: Provisions of the constitution would allow for the holding of general meetings on the initiative of either a proportion of the members or the trustees, broadly reflective of what has always been done. The only new element would be the possibility of holding a written ballot on a decision outside a General Meeting. We have no plans to use this power, but have included it in our constitution simply to stay as close as possible to the model constitution provided by the Charity Commission.

Trustees: We propose that there should be at least three trustees (this is the Charity Commission minimum). The Charity Commission model expects that one third of the trustees shall retire (but may then be re-elected) every year. This implies that the trustees would normally serve three-year terms. We do not expect that all members of the Committee would need or want to be trustees. Therefore the Trustees would need to use their powers of delegation to empower a committee consisting of the trustees and additional people designated by the AGM.

Electronic communications: The constitution would permit the Committee to communicate with members by email.

Further provisions: The Society would be required to keep proper records. The methods for dealing with disputes and for amending the Constitution would be set out in the constitution which would also make provision for the Society to be dissolved or wound up.

We would encourage all members to attend the AGM in order to contribute to discussion and to the decision about whether we change our name and status. Interview with David Gluckman

What do Baileys Irish Cream, Le Piat d'Or and Purdey's have In common? They were all created by long-time Belsize resident David Gluckman. Born and educated in South Africa, David came to England in 1961 to work in advertising.

He changed career to become a product development consultant and in 1973 set up his own business in Soho. His first client was drinks company IDV, which eventually became Diageo. He worked for them for nearly forty years and claims to have had one of the most enjoyable jobs in the world. "I travelled everywhere; Mauritius, Australia, Brazil, Japan, Korea, the US and all over Europe. I even managed four trips on Concorde. And all the time I was looking for new ideas in the drinks business."

One of his first briefs was to create a new drink for IDV's Irish company. It was looking for a brand for export. David and his partner's approach was simple and inspirational. They decided to try an unexpected mix of Irish whiskey and..... cream. The Jameson's and tub of cream were bought from International Stores on Berwick Street. When the mix didn't work, they improvised further by adding sugar and Cadbury's Drinking Chocolate. And that was how Baileys was born. It would became the world's biggest-selling liqueur. The name came from the restaurant Baileys Bistro below their Greek Street office.

In the 1970s most of the wine consumed in England came from France. The French made few concessions to English consumers who found it hard to distinguish one brand from another because of staid labelling and difficult brand names. David helped create a French wine tailored to English tastes at the time. Its distinctively-shaped bottle with its stylish gold label made it easily recognisable. It was simply named Le Piat d'Or and its taste reflected the 'Exceptionally Smooth' claim on the neck label. The brand became a best-seller and many readers will remember the slogan "The French adore le Piat d'Or" – even if they didn't.

In a career that saw over 80 brands brought to market, some of the more familiar ones include Aqua Libra, one of the iconic drinks in the 1980s and a favourite of Princess Diana, The Singleton single malt, Smirnoff Black Label, Ciroc grape vodka, Sheridan's cream liqueur and Tanqueray Ten gin. And after his spell with IDV/Diageo ended, he

teamed up with two ex-colleagues to introduce the world's first Premium cream liqueur, Coole Swan, named after the famous poem by W B Yeats.



How did David go about the creative process? The answer is instinct and judgment. His ideas flowed from his own thinking and came more easily from watching and playing cricket than from a structured day in the office surrounded by textbooks from business schools. (He played for local pub team, Washington CC till he was 75 and many of his ideas were first sampled by his team mates.)

David has lived in Belsize Park since 1974 and appreciates its quiet, convenient location. He recently published a book about his unique career "That s*it will never sell!" (Prideaux Press). The title comes from the first reaction of a New York pundit to Baileys – somewhat surprisingly in light of the fact that Baileys is now the US's most successful cream liqueur.

This beautifully designed book is written in a light-hearted and anecdotal style, which make it an enjoyable and highly engrossing read. An extract published in the Irish Times was rated the top culture story on the paper's website in 2017. The Guardian rated the book as one of the best on drink last year and interest in the book has led David to be invited to speak at the Dalkey Literary Festival and at various universities and business schools. We wish it every success.

CRIME AND SECURITY

The Police write: Modern phones are more than just for calls or texting and some people can spend hours on their devices.
