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
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programme. Please give serious thought to whether you can help, and don't hesitate to contact us to find out more (see pages 2 and 4).





If you already pay by **standing order**, you don't need to do anything, because your bank will deal with it automatically.

If you normally pay by **cheque**, you'll find a letter and application form enclosed with this Newsletter, to return, with your £10 cheque, to our Membership Secretary, Anne Stevens. However, it saves us a lot of time if members pay by standing order, and you can switch to this method by filling in the relevant section of the application form.

The Olave Centre: elegant headquarters of a worldwide movement

Girl guides' grown-up home
In Lyndhurst Road, a little way above the corner with Haverstock Hill, stands an intriguing group of white buildings, historic and modern. This is the Olave Centre, home to the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts, a representative of which has become one

Named after Olave, the girl guide movement's founder and wife of Robert Baden Powell, the Centre includes traces of Rosslyn Lodge, which was built in 1810 for the first Lord Rosslyn, and once housed a first world war military hospital.

of BRA's newest members.

The flag-decked modern building, Pax Lodge, was built in 1991 as one of four international centres for world girl guides and scouts. Members may be more familiar with it as the venue for local National Trust meetings, as well as brownie and guide troop sessions.

What makes Belsize special?

BRA's Local List nominations gain recognition

Camden is consulting on a draft Local List of buildings, street features and landscapes that make a valuable contribution to the area. We're happy to see that ten of the 14 nominations we made were accepted, while the remainder were considered to be protected in other ways already.

The houses that led us to campaign for a Local List, **2c and d Belsize Park Gardens**, are included, as well as other modernist houses at **1 Village Close**, **40 Ornan Lane** and **17a Belsize Lane** and **Tasker Road**. Also on the draft list are the traditional **lampposts** in Belsize Village, the wide pavements on **Haverstock Hill** and several traditional **pillar boxes**. The **Belsize Library**, which we thought was covered in other ways, has been included, too.

At Swiss Cottage, the **leisure centre**, **Hampstead theatre**, **water feature** and main buildings of the **Central School of Art and Drama** have all been included. We hope this may add to the arguments against a tower block being built at 100 Avenue Road.

UPDATE: Police service



Having closed the Hampstead Police Station, the Metropolitan Police want to set up a local contact

point that the public can visit at fixed times. They have now tried out four possible options: Hampstead Town Hall, the Royal Free, Starbucks in South End Green and the Premier Inn. We have expressed the view that the only viable option is Hampstead Town Hall because of its location and facilities, and because it is a public rather than a commercial

building. We are now waiting to hear what their decision will be.

UPDATE: Fire station

The London Fire and Emergency
Planning Authority has decided to close
10 fire stations, including the one in
Belsize, by 9 January 2014. We
understand that Camden, with several
other local councils, plan to
seek a Judicial Review of this
decision. If this is not
successful, the Grade II Listed

building in Lancaster Grove will be sold.

UPDATE: Recycling

When wheelie bins appeared in Belsize, they brought plenty of queries from BRA members. We asked Camden's Principal Environmental Services Officer, Ann Baker, to provide some answers

Q Why are wheelie bins left on the property boundary sometimes ignored? Why are they sometimes returned on the road rather than inside front gardens or drives? Why aren't wheelie bins left on the street always emptied?

A Wheelie bins should be placed within the property boundary, but on the edge of the property front, by 7am on collection day; the crews should collect and return the containers to that point.

On some occasions, residents have put receptacles on the pavement and the crews have put them back in the same place. This is contrary to our advice and we have been trying to ensure they don't do this. If you see this taking place, please get in touch.

There is an idea that some containers may not be serviced because the volume of recycling in the bin comes less than halfway up. This isn't right. Any bin that is presented in view and unobstructed should be emptied. Again, please alert us if this isn't happening.

Q Some members have noticed that food bins have become scarce since wheelie bins arrived. Why is this?

A When we introduced the wheelie bins and rescheduled the recycling services, there were changes to the collection crews. This could have affected the food and garden waste service as new crews might not have been familiar with where residents placed their containers. There have been no policy changes on how this service operates so the brown bins should not go missing. If they do, please get in touch.

Q Could we have an update on extending wheelie bins to larger properties?

A We have always provided wheelie bins and larger eurobins for recycling at multiple occupancy properties on request, and continue to offer these where suitable. Residents who would like these types of recycling containers should check with their neighbours and managing agents before contacting us to discuss options and agree a suitable site and delivery of the bins.
