Talking Belsize: our Annual General Meeting

Chairwoman Averil Nottage reported on the BRA year at our AGM on 10 March, and members took the opportunity to raise local issues before the traditional tea and cakes

At a packed meeting in Hampstead Town Hall, Jill Tyrrell was thanked for her many years of service as our treasurer (see below) and two new committee members were introduced: Neil Harris, who moves straight into the treasurer slot, and Judith Farbey.

Members heard about a campaign to have stronger planning rules applied to Parkhill and Upper Park Conservation Area (see page 5) and about a project launched by the Belsize Community Library to produce and publish a book of reminiscences of Belsize Park, to be entitled Belsize Remembered (see page 4).

Among other topics raised by members were basements. It appears that Camden Council's refusals of permission for basements are being

overturned by Planning Inspectors at appeal. It was noted that this is an issue elsewhere in London and nationally, and BRA should seek to be part of any national campaign against inappropriate basement development. There were also concerns about proposals for the redevelopment of the former florist's site next to Belsize Park Station and the mix of retail outlets in Belsize Park.

Yes to a borough-wide 20mph speed limit: that was the verdict of the majority of members present (around 85 in total). But there were concerns about how rigorously it would be policed

Sunshine and local secrets: our Eton College Estate history walk

Weren't we lucky, the 75 of us who stepped out from the corner of Eton Villas and Steele's Road on 14 April? Not only was the sun shining but we also had a fascinating talk from Aileen Hammond as we walked, not to mention a delicious tea at Sarum Hall school afterwards.

Sadly, there isn't space to do more than pick out a couple of key points from the talk - such as how, in 1449, Henry VI granted to Eton College the piece of land which became the Estate that still bears its name.

It was the 1830s before the first buildings were put up, around the same time that the London-

to-Birmingham Railway was carved straight across the middle of the Estate. In the process, our area gained a tremendous but hidden asset, the Primrose Hill Tunnel, designed by Robert Stephenson (no, not George), which we were lucky enough to glimpse through

the as-yet leafless branches at the side of Primrose Hill Road (*see below*). We heard the unfortunate tale of the maisonettes that had been built over the

> tunnel and collapsed in 1976, and the much older story of the uncharitable Eton College surveyor who was against having mews near the houses, because people living there might expect the Estate to provide a school for their children!

Looking for a tradesman? Ask a BRA member!

The special treat with this issue is your copy of our **Tradesmen You Can Trust** booklet for 2013. It comes to you courtesy of its compiler, Sarah Courtin, and all the other BRA members who took the trouble to contribute details of new tradesmen and reviews of those already listed. As a result of your efforts, this edition includes more tradesmen than ever, all of whom have done good quality work and given good service to BRA members. This year, there are more than 180 listed, including 40 new ones, and we have added two new categories: Pest Control and Furniture Makers and Restorers.

Inevitably, we have also lost some tradesmen, either because of negative reviews or because we had received no feedback about them for more than three years. It is a dilemma for us to decide whether to include tradesmen if we haven't had any reviews of them for a few years: we neither want to lose valued tradesmen nor keep repeating information that is out of date. In response to discussions at the AGM, we have left in tradesmen for a third year, but indicated whether it is the second or third year they've been included without a new recommendation (details are on the **TYCT** contents page). You can help us overcome this problem by always remembering to send us your views about the tradesmen you use. There is a recommendation form inside the booklet or you can download one from the BRA website, or send information by email to TYCT@belsize.org.uk.

In the meantime, we hope you will find all the worthwhile tradesmen you need this year within the covers of **Tradesmen You Can Trust 2013**.

'In the early 1970s I would go with a gang of friends to Conrad's Bistro, a cheap and cheerful French restaurant in the cellar. The tables were in vaulted alcoves with gingham cloths and candles stuck in a wax encrusted wine bottle. We also went to Falafels, an Israeli restaurant on Haverstock Hill, a couple of doors down from the Sir Richard Steele pub. Looking back, it doesn't seem very exciting, but Middle Eastern food was rare and exotic then. I don't think Conrad's Bistro survived the 70s, but Falafels lasted for another 35 years.

When I moved to Belsize in the 1990s, the area felt very continental. There were cafes with tables on the pavements and Crispin's, the supermarket in Englands Lane, was open every day from first thing in the morning until late at Barratt's the butchers night. still had their cashier, Hilda, sitting in a little wooden cubicle to collect our money. She had worked there for about 70 years by the time she finally retired.'Averil Nottage

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Help Parkhill and Upper Park buildings gain better protection

Do you live in the Parkhill and Upper Park Conservation Area? Would you be willing to support a campaign to help conserve local buildings? If so, your support is needed now!

The land on both sides of Haverstock Hill was originally all part of the historic Belsize Estate, but the buildings in the Parkhill and Upper Park Conservation Area (shaded darker on the map, right) don't have the same protection as those in the Belsize CA. BRA member Gene Adams is campaigning for extra planning restrictions, called Article 4 directions, to apply in the Parkhill and Upper Park CA.

Article 4 Directions were introduced in the Belsize CA in 2010. What that means is that householders need planning permission before making changes to the appearance of their property. It does not prevent all changes, but ensures that all alterations are properly designed and approved. We agree that the same protection needs to be extended to the Parkhill and Upper Park CA, in order to preserve the character of the area.


Camden currently has no plans to make further Article 4 directions in conservation areas. So a very strong case needs to be made, supported by local councillors, before the Council

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will consider providing the necessary resources for this - and reducing residents' rights to develop their properties without planning permission.

To make the case for Article 4, a survey would need to demonstrate that developments taking place under the current planning arrangements are eroding the character and appearance of the area. Singing the blue-plaque blues?

Will it close? There's still time to have your say!



As reported in previous Newsletters, the fire station in Lancaster Grove is threatened with closure as part of London-wide spending cuts. <u>UPDATE</u>: Hampstead police station

The station building will close, and changes are afoot in the meantime



After years of rumours, we now know that Hampstead Police Station will definitely close, although this is unlikely to happen before a number of changes to local policing have taken place. Kentish Town police station is to stay open 24/7, rather than just during office hours as previously suggested. There are to be contact points to report non-urgent matters at the Swiss Cottage Safer Neighbourhood Team

Recycling changes wheeled out

For some of us, this summer will herald the end of blue bags and green boxes for our household recycling, in favour of big green wheelie bins designed to hold paper and card as well as plastic, metal and glass. But don't panic if this is new to you or you don't think it would be practical in your case. Despite initial misunderstandings, only households that want wheelie bins need to have them. Neighbours can share bins, and people who would need help taking the bin to the edge of their property phoning 0800 9888 569. The closing date for responses is 28 May.

As part of the consultation, a series of public meetings will be held in different London boroughs. In Camden, the meeting will take place on Thursday, 30 May, 7pm to 9pm at McNamara Suite, London Irish Centre, 50-52 Camden Square, London NW1 9XB.

base and, it is hoped, at the Royal Free Hospital. These contact points will be open from 7pm to 8pm on Wednesdays and Fridays and 2pm to 3pm on Saturdays.

From June, the Safer Neighbourhood Teams will be restructured, with a part-time sergeant, a constable and a community support officer for each ward and about 30 other officers allocated to a 'cluster' of about six wards. Safer Neighbourhood Panels will no longer set ward priorities, but the Inspector for the 'cluster' may make 'promises'. We are waiting to hear which other wards will be clustered with Belsize. The priority for BRA is for the police to be accessible and responsive to local needs. It is also important that they work seamlessly across wards. We will monitor how the new cluster arrangements work in practice.

can request assisted collection. Just respond to your letter from Camden or write to: Environment Services, Roy Shaw Centre, 3-5 Cressy Road, London, NW3 2ND or email recyclingiseasy@camden.gov.uk. You won't have had that letter if you live in a property considered too small to be suitable or containing six or more dwellings. Other arrangements, such as roadside communal bins, will be made for larger properties, and BRA will monitor these.
